ANSWERS LAST CALL**

**John Christian Given Honors at  
Soldiers' Home, Quincy, Where

John Christian, another of the few civil war veterans left in this section of Illinois, answered the last call e'er the dawn of a new day, Saturday Mar. 20, 1926. The end came at the home of his son, C. H. Christian of Birmingham, Ill., where he had made his home.

J. H. Nichols, funeral director, accompanied by Joyce E. Robbins of Plymouth took the remains over-land to Quincy Monday morning where funeral services were held at 1:30 o'clock p. m. Besides the bereaved relatives a large cortege of comrades were present at the last rites. The impressive funeral services were in charge of the G. A. R. and the chaplain of the Soldiers' Home. Comrade Christian was given all the honors due a civil war veteran. Taps and the bugle were sounded and on a new grave in the Soldiers' Home cemetery, an American flag flies to the breeze—in that grave rests the body of John Christian but his soul has soared to realms unknown—where, when the bugle sounds he will be in line.

John Christian died March 20th at the home of his son, C. H. Christian after suffering with heart trouble and complications, aged 87 years, 7 months and 13 days. He was a son of Jesse and Elizabeth (Shadrick) Christian, and was born in the state of Tennessee on August 7, 1838. He came to this state with his parents at the age of eight years, and settled near Augusta, Ill.

In the year of 1861 he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Adams, living at Pulaski, Ill. Eight children were born to this union, six having preceded him in death. Two surviving C. H. Christian of Birmingham, Ill., Mrs. W. R. Cone of Peoria, Ill.

May 30, 1898 this father and two children were bereft of a mother's loving care. He was again united in marriage to Mrs. Margaret McRoy, nee's April 22, 1902 and on July 9th 1924 he was again bereft of a wife's

## Erect Marker for Revolutionary War Veteran at Pulaski Cemetery

Warren L. Van Dine of Burnside, Member-At-Large of the National Revolutionary Graves Registry Committee of the Sons of the American Revolution, was in Augusta Monday, Nov. 30, putting up a government marker at the grave of Richard Rose, Revolutionary War veteran buried in Pulaski cemetery. Mark Allen of Pulaski helped with this work.

The government marker put up for Rose is an upright American white marble headstone 43 inches by 13 inches and four inches thick. It is a beautiful monument. People of the county have known since Mr. Rose's death in 1842 that Augusta has a Revolutionary War veteran, but his grave has been hard to locate in the Pulaski cemetery. This has been especially true in recent years as the small and cheap marble monument put up by the Rose family almost 120 years ago has become worn by weathering. The inscription can hardly be made out even after one succeeds in finding the grave among the many in the cemetery.

Mr. Van Dine visited this cemetery last March. He decided this hero of 1776, as he is called on the family stone, needed a government stone in addition to the family one, a stone which people could find and read after it was found.

The Pension Bureau in Washington, D. C., furnished Mr. Rose with photocopies of pension application papers filled out by him in the 1820's and by his widow after his death in the 1840's. The bureau keeps papers like this on file indefinitely, running off photocopies for a fee of \$1.00 on request. From these papers was obtained necessary data to procure the government marker which the U. S. government furnished free, freight prepaid from the place of manufacture somewhere in Georgia.

The inscription on this marker reads:

Richard Rose  
Virginia,  
Private, 1st Regt.  
Light Dragoons  
Continental Line  
Revolutionary War  
September 8, 1753  
February 14, 1842

The pension papers indicate many additional facts about the life of the veteran in addition to those used in the inscription, such as he moved from Virginia to Indiana some time after the Revolution and from there at some later date to our county in Illinois. He had a large family of children and was in almost complete poverty, making it necessary for him

to apply for a pension. To add to his calamities he suffered very poor health in his later years.

The Harriet J. Walker book "Soldiers of the Revolution Buried in Illinois," Los Angeles, 1917, states about Rose:

"Richard Rose was born in 1753. He died in Hancock county February 14, 1842, aged 88 years, and is buried in Lot 9, Range B, in Pulaski cemetery, near Augusta. He served in the Virginia line of troops and was pensioned."

The outfit in the Virginia line, according to the pension papers, was the First Regiment of Light Dragoons commanded by Col. James White, in a company commanded by Capt. James Gunn. Light Dragoons was of course a lightly armed cavalry outfit so equipped for fast movement.

The government marker was placed at the foot of the grave. The family monument was of course left undisturbed at the head of the grave where loved ones of the deceased who are themselves gone now put it in 1842.

The inscription on this monument reads, "A Hero of 1776, Richard Rose, Died February 14, 1842, Aged 88 years, 5 months, 3 days." This indicates by figuring back he was born September 8, 1753.

Mr. Van Dine has arranged with the Shadrach Bond Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution to hold an unveiling ceremony at the grave. They voted to do this at their September meeting according to a recent news story in the Hancock County Journal of Carthage. Mrs. Stanley Rhodes, wife of a Carthage College faculty member, is now Regent of this chapter which is one of the oldest in the nation. She stated recently when interviewed that the chapter planned to hold this ceremony in the Pulaski cemetery some time in the spring when weather moderates sufficiently for an outdoor ceremony.

The National Graves committee on which Mr. Van Dine is serving in the S. A. R., is in its fourth year of a huge canvass of the earth compiling reports on graves of all veterans of the American Revolution. They are organized from top to local level in twenty-seven states where these men are known to be buried, putting data obtained by their workers on microfilm in their national headquarters building in Washington, D. C., for use of relatives, historians, etc. They recently bought a new building, the former residence of Secretary of War Patrick Hurley of the Herbert Hoover administration, paying \$165,000 on the counter for this piece of real estate. By Aug. 1 of this year they had reports in on ten thousand of these Revolution men.

Eight are buried in this county, seven of whom are listed on a bronze plaque on a wall of a corridor between the offices of the county clerk and county recorder in the county court house in Carthage. Rose is one of the seven listed there.

Mr. Van Dine is placing government markers at graves of several which are no longer adequately marked, if they ever were, to give them the place among our county's dead they so richly deserve and to make it possible for grateful county people to locate their graves easily for Decoration Days.

Augusta is proud to have a veteran of that immortal army which won the nation's independence buried here. The Sons of the American Revolution and the Daughters and the nation may rest assured we will care for this grave with all possible care and tenderness.

The Virginia Continental Line in which this man served was one of the finest outfits in the American Army and one of the finest bodies of fighting men in the world at that time. It was the Continental Line of the various states which served the year around and which had the necessary training to battle the famous British regiments to a standstill on fields of blood. And they did exactly that. The militia regiments in whom some of our eight county men served were only called out a few months each year after harvest and they had but little training and poor equipment usually.

The Pulaski cemetery is literally sprinkled with graves of men who fought in wars of the early republic. In addition to this Revolutionary veteran there is interred there a War of 1812 man, two who fought in both the Mexican and Civil Wars, and twenty-four who wore the Union Army blue in the Civil War. This was so stated in the Carthage Gazette of July 23, 1920 and reprinted in the Charles J. Schofield county history put out in 1921, P. 919.

There are probably veterans of the

Spanish-American War and of the two World Wars buried there by this time, forty years now having passed since this list was put out by the Gazette.

Guy Dewhirst, pastor of the Augusta M. E. church, officiating. Burial was in the Pulaski cemetery.

George Thomas Woods was born on June 6, 1857 at Hannibal, Missouri. He was united in marriage to Mrs. Eva Bramlett, who preceded him in death thirty-one years ago. To this union were born three daughters and three sons, one son dying eight years ago. The surviving children are: Downing Woods, of Hannibal, Mo.; Ernest Woods, of Hannibal, Mo.; Mrs. Emma Quinn, of Gary, Indiana; Mrs. J. C. ## FUNERAL RITES FOR RALPH CRAIN HELD AT QUINCY

Interment in Woodland Mausoleum  
At Quincy For Prominent  
Augusta Native

Ralph Waldo Crain was born on September 16, 1877, on the Crain farm two miles west of Huntsville, Schuyler County Illinois. This was the same farm on which his grandfather, Rev. Wm. Crain, settled in 1835 and which remained in the possession of the Crain family for 110 years.

Ralph attended the Baxter school which was a short distance east of his home and later attended the Augusta high school, graduating with the class of 1896. He then went to the Kennedy Normal in Rushville for one term in preparation for teaching. He taught at the Pine Grove school and the next year at the Round Top school, both one room country schools which have recently been discontinued.

In the fall of 1899 Ralph enlisted in Company G, 38th United States Volunteer Infantry at Webb City, Mo. From the Presidio in San Francisco he was sent to Manila. For some time his Company was stationed in Lipa on the island of Luzon where they were engaged in a series of campaigns until the Philippine Insurrection was quelled. While in Lipa he was asked to teach English in a boys' school and in this way he became proficient in the Spanish language. Later he served for more than a year as Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue with headquarters in Iloilo on the island of Panay, a job as dangerous as his Army duties had been for he rode horseback thru the jungles carrying the actual cash on his person.

Determined to see the world before returning home, Ralph took passage on a tramp steamer loaded with hemp. Leaving Manila, the British freighter, Melbourne, carrying three other passengers, came to New York by the way of Ceylon and the Suez Canal, arriving in New York in October, 1902.

After attending Gem City Business College in Quincy, Ralph accepted a position with the Remington Typewriter Co. in Salina, Kansas.

On June 7, 1905 Ralph was married to Sadie Thelma Caddick of Quincy, Illinois. They made their first home in Topeka, Kansas. In 1906 Ralph was transferred to Mexico City where Remington was opening their first agency in a Spanish speaking country. Two years later they sent him to Havana, Cuba, where he remained as representative of the company for 33 years. 1932.

Since 1928 he has made his home in Arlington, Virginia. Taking advantage of the educational facilities of Washington, D. C., Ralph attended Law School graduating in his 60th year standing in 8th place in a class of 270 students.

In 1936 he went into the real estate business and became a prominent realtor of Arlington, Virginia.

home was always open not only to all relatives and friends but also to any of his fellow countrymen. Many nationally known Americans have shared his hospitality and he was equally ready to extend assistance to any in need. He was keenly interested in the United Spanish War Veterans, serving one term as Commander of the Post at Havana, Cuba. He was a frequent contributor to the National Tribune a paper devoted to the interests of veterans and was also author of the Pulaski section of the "Augusta Story," a historical book published by the local Daughters of the American Revolution. He was a member of the Pulaski church, a history of which is included in the Pulaski Story.

A few years ago Ralph organized the survivors of the 38th Volunteer Infantry and has since taken an active part in their annual reunions.

Notwithstanding his busy life and heavy responsibilities, he found time throughout the years to write almost daily letters to his mother, and took great pleasure in his annual visits home.

Ralph died unexpectedly at his home, 4399 Lee Highway, Arlington, Va., on April 26, 1949. The funeral was held in Arlington at 11 A.M., on April 29; there having been a brief service the evening before, conducted by the Spanish War Veterans. Interment was made in Woodland Mausoleum at Quincy, Illinois, after services there at 2 P.M., May 2, conducted by Rev. A. K. Byrns, a lifelong friend of the Crain family.

Ralph W. Crain is survived by his widow and two sons, Ralph W. Crain, Jr., of Arlington, Va., and Earl T. Crain of Santiago, Chili; three grandchildren, Richard and Elizabeth Crain of Arlington, Va., and Virginia Crain of Santiago, Chili; one sister, Mary Crain of Augusta; three brothers, Harry Crain, and Frank Crain of Augusta and Wm. M. Crain of Arlington, Va. He was preceded in death by his parents, Wm. H. Crain, in 1904 and Rachel Baxter Crain in 1932 and by his brother, Fred Crain, in 1920. Two sisters and two brothers died in infancy.

Thus closes the story of a colorful life marked by intense loyalty and devotion to his country, his family and his friends.

## WM. M. CRAIN CENTENARIAN CALLED TO REST

Life's Chapter Closed Wednesday Night, November 18;  
Final Rites Saturday

William Maurice Crain, Augusta centenarian, was called to peaceful and final slumber Wednesday night, Nov. 18, at the McDonough District hospital in Macomb. He had entered the hospital that afternoon. Mr. Crain had been confined to his bed for several weeks as the result of sustaining a hip fracture in a fall while in Augusta's down town business district. Until that time he was remarkably active considering his advanced age of 101 years. He possessed a keen intellect and enjoyed the visits of kindred and friends.

### Final Rites Saturday

Final rites for the esteemed Mr. Crain were held Saturday afternoon at 2 at the Augusta Methodist church, where he faithfully worshipped.

Rev. James Weiss, pastor, officiated in the services that were in charge of the Cookson Funeral home.

Rev. Weiss also prepared and read the life sketch and paid tribute to the departed one.

Wendell Mathis sang, "Lead Kindly Light" and "Love That Will Not Let Me Go," two favorite hymns of Mr. Crain. Mrs. Leo McCutchan presided at the organ.

Interment was in the Pulaski cemetery, not too far from the old Crain homestead, where the family enjoyed such a happy childhood together.

### In Memoriam

William Maurice Crain was born September 5, 1863 near Huntsville, Ill., to William Harris and Rachel Baxter Crain.

He attended Huntsville and Rushville schools and the Augusta High school.

He was united in marriage to Sarah Ann Newcomb, February 21, 1894, and to this union was born one daughter, Mrs. Helen Houghton, of Arlington, Virginia.

Mr. Crain served as a Federal Government employee for 35 years and for the past 13 years has resided with his sister, Miss Mary Crain, here in Augusta.

Mr. Crain was a member of Myron Parker Masonic Lodge No. 27, and the Order of the Eastern Star of Washington D. C.

As a devoted member of the Methodist church since his youth, Mr. Crain served in an official capacity many times. On many occasions Mr. Crain said that the most rewarding work he ever did was teaching a Sunday School class of boys and young men, several of whom have become ministers of the Methodist church. He considered working with the young people as the most important work of the church.

He had an outgoing spirit, was not only loyal to his old friends, but enjoyed making new ones, which he continued to do throughout his life.

He was loved and respected by everyone and his kind and unselfish actions will long be remembered by all.

Mr. Crain passed away at McDonough District hospital in Macomb, on November 18, 1964, at the age of 101 years, two months and 13 days.

He was preceded in death by his wife in October of 1920; also two sisters and five brothers.

He leaves to mourn his passing a daughter, Mrs. Helen Houghton of Arlington, Virginia, a sister, Miss Mary Crain of Augusta, a brother, Harry of Augusta, one granddaughter and one great granddaughter, as well as a host of friends.

# J.B.F. AGNEW PASSES AWAY AT FORT WORTH

Former Local Postmaster Passes  
Away From Injuries Received in  
Fall. In Memoriam

James B. F. Agnew, 37, pioneer valley advocate of farmers' cooperatives and a tall, picturesque figure in McAllen, Texas, died suddenly Friday night, January 2, at Fort Worth, Texas. Mr. Agnew fractured his left hip in a fall December 12 while visiting at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. P. Williams, at Fort Worth. He had been in a hospital in McAllen since then and has been returned to his home Friday evening hours before his death.

He was perhaps best known for the Model Ford of early vintage which he insisted on driving for many years. Although it was long outmoded by streamlined models, he continued to drive it until the year of his retirement.

Mr. Agnew served a term as president of the Pine Growers cooperative and at one time was on the board of directors of McAllen cotton gin. He was a vocal advocate of cooperative sales organizations for valley farmers and at one time underwent an extensive study of finance.

Funeral services were held in McAllen at the Scott Martin Chapel Monday January 3 at 1 p. m. Burial was made at Rose Lawn Cemetery. Pallbearers were Scott Ford, Strickland, Love, Kelly, George Sawyer, H. Harbison and Granger Smith.

### In Memoriam

James Benjamin Finley Agnew, the fifth child of Andrew and Clarinda Cott Agnew, was born May 2, 1860 on his father's farm in Birmingham township, Schuyler County, Illinois. During his early manhood he attended normal school in Kirksville, Mo. He later as a young man went to Greensburg, Mo. during the pioneer days of that region. He returned to Augusta and married Luchida Jane Farrow in 1901 and there the first two children were born. His life being centered in farming, he returned to the Agnew farm and his two youngest children were born. During the years of World War I he was postmaster in Augusta and upon the death of his mother in February of 1919 he sold his farm and invested in forty acres near McAllen, Texas and moved his family to the Rio Grande Valley where he farmed continuously until 1923.

Just as in Augusta, where he was one of the first stockholders in the Sulloh Mutual Telephone Co., he helped found the Augusta Cement and Tile Co. and was an officer in the first Good Road Association in western Illinois, so in the valley, he was interested in the building up of his community.

He was a life-long member of the Methodist church and was best known among the friends and neighbors of the family as a kind husband, a devoted and indulgent father and an honest citizen, one who was always interested in the politics of his country and community.

His wife preceded him in death in August, 1947. Since that time he had made his home alternately with his children, Mrs. E. P. Williams of Fort Worth, A. T. Agnew of Weslaco and Mrs. Phillip Boeye of McAllen. Besides these children, he is survived by a sister, Mrs. A. J. Coddling, age 91, of Newton, Kansas, and a grandson, Richard Agnew Boeye. Mr. Agnew was in good health until December 11 when he suffered a general collapse and in a fall fractured his left hip. His death occurred Friday evening, January 2, in Ft. Worth, Texas.
